Spending Among Group Plan Enrollees With Multiple Health Conditions: A Look at High-Cost Claimants in 2021

Examining the health care claims of 8.6 million group plan enrollees in 2021, we show that over 80 percent of top spenders in 2021 had at least 1 out of 5 chronic conditions: heart disease, respiratory conditions, musculoskeletal conditions, skin disorders, and nervous system conditions. These conditions are not only the most prevalent conditions among top spenders, but they are also generally the most prevalent comorbidities among those with any of these five conditions. In particular:

- Among the top 1 percent of health care spenders, 91 percent had at least one of these five chronic conditions, and total spending among these enrollees represented 91 percent of all health care spending. Average spending per person in this group was nearly \$200,000 (Panel A). Half had heart disease and at least 1 out of the 4 other conditions (Panel B), while 46 percent had at least a respiratory condition (Panel C), 39 percent had at least a musculoskeletal condition (Panel D), 32 percent had at least a skin disorder (Panel E), and half had at least a nervous system condition and at least 1 out of the 4 other conditions (Panel F).
- Among the top 2–5 percent of health care spenders, 89 percent had at least 1 of these 5 chronic conditions, and total spending among these enrollees represented 90 percent of all health care spending. Average spending per person in this group was nearly \$80,000 (Panel A). Approximately 40 percent had heart disease at a minimum (Panel B).
- Among the top 6–10 percent of health care spenders, 86 percent had at least 1 of these 5 chronic conditions, and total spending among these enrollees represented 89 percent of all health care spending. Average spending per person in this group was approximately \$50,000 (Panel A). Thirty-five percent have a nervous system condition and at least 1 out of the 4 other conditions (Panel F).
- Among the top 11–20 percent of health care spenders, 83 percent have at least 1 of these 5 chronic conditions, and total spending among these enrollees represents 87 percent of all health care spending. Average spending per person in this group was around \$30,000 (Panel A). A third had heart disease and at least 1 out of the 4 other conditions (Panel B). Three in 10 have a musculoskeletal condition at a minimum (Panel D).

Note: "Any 1 of 5" means has heart disease, a respiratory condition, a musculoskeletal condition, a skin disorder, or a nervous system condition.

Data and Methods

We analyzed the MerativeTM MarketScan[®] Commercial Database, which contains pharmacy and medical claims data on a sample of 8.6 million enrollees in a non-capitated employment-based health plan in 2021. The study cohort included individuals under age 65, residing in all U.S. geographic regions, and enrolled in a variety of plan types. Using relevant procedure codes from claims, we derived health condition indicators.

¹ Diabetes and mental disorders are the other most common comorbidities among enrollees with any of these five health conditions. Over 20 percent of top spenders with at least 1 of these 5 conditions had diabetes, and over 25 percent had a mental disorder.
