



When Do Women Retire? Expectation vs. Reality

AGE AT RETIREMENT

Women of different marital statuses face a range of retirement challenges.
One of these challenges is a disconnect between when women expect to retire and the reality of when they do.

Divorced and never-married women workers were more likely to expect never to retire than married women workers.



REVIEWING RATIOS

Women underestimate how soon they will retire. Nearly six times as many divorced women were retired by age 60 compared with divorced women workers who expect to be retired that early.

More than three times as many divorced women retired at ages 60-62 as divorced women workers expect to retire at those ages. This indicates a need to bridge the gap in understanding between the expected and likely retirement ages for this cohort of women.
